

Ford's son did a fantastic job of sharing his and his family's life story, hitting all the high marks. "Glenn Ford A Life" is a behind the scenes story of Hollywood film making and the private family struggles of two mega movie stars and their only child Peter who writes with hindsight his views of

life with famous actors in Beverly Hills. The book is entertaining and extremely informative. His documentation is amazing regarding the films, directors, actors, and writers during the period when Hollywood studios had a strangle hold on its participants. Glenn Ford was a handsome talented man who played romantic leads with glamorous ladies like Rita Hayworth in "Gilda", and he married the fabulous tap dancer Eleanor Powell whom Fred Astaire said was the best dancer he ever worked with. The Fords lived next door to Charlie Chaplin who accidentally ran over and killed Peter's German Shepard dog named Bill. This is a tiny example of the fascinating events retold by Peter.
