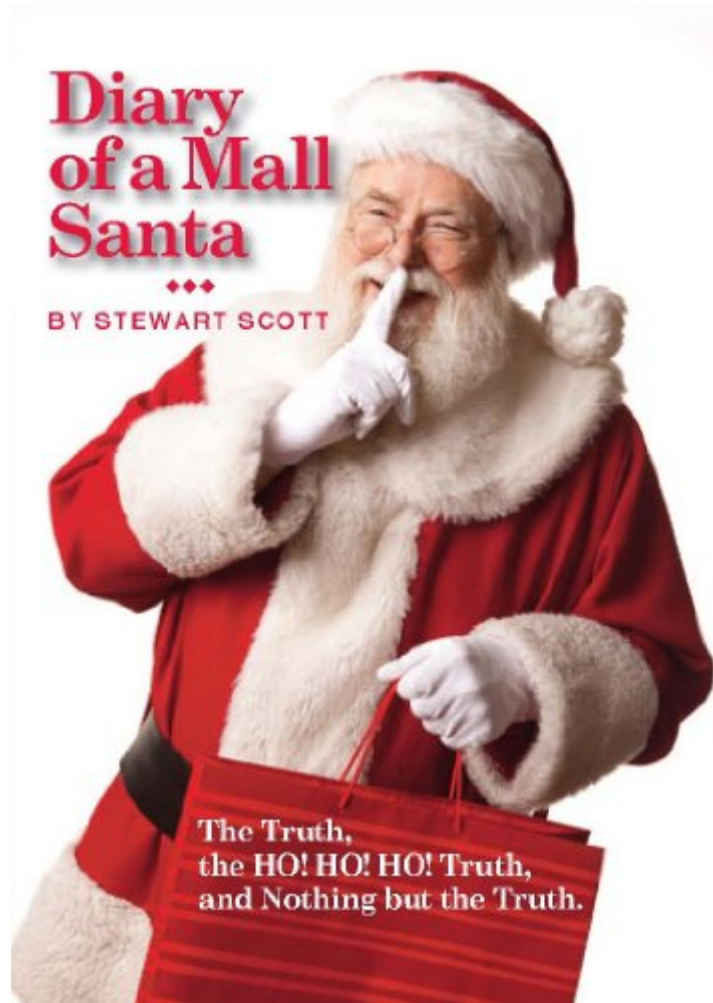




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Diary Of A Mall Santa

By reading this book, you will gain a greater insight into the challenges Santa faces with each new visitor. You just don't expect to hear some things from kids and you might be amazed at how brazen some people can be. There are stories of unruly children, bossy adults, teenagers, terrified children and parents who will do anything they can to get the perfect picture with Santa. There are definitely some hazards involved with being Santa which I had never even considered. Stewart Scott takes it all in stride and has a true talent for helping parents make the Santa experience a happy one. But what do you do when a child asks for world peace and even tells you how it could be accomplished! What would most Santas like to tell parents about the perfect visit? Now there is one clever and somewhat slightly naughty thing this Santa does to amuse himself when people are taking pictures. It is laugh-out-loud funny. You'll just have to read it. Along the way through the diary we learn about the real origin of Christmas stockings. We learn the real meaning of the word Christmas and learn a little about the original Santa who was actually sort of skinny. In fact Stewart Scott says that a lot of people say he is way too skinny to be Santa. Well if you have ever wondered what kids ask for for Christmas this gives some insight. Some parents even try to get Santa to tell their kids they won't get any presents unless they behave. Almost the entire book made me smile and left me with a happy feeling that borderlines on Christmas joy. I'm glad I read this book during the holiday season. This is a great little book for the Christmas season. It is well written and a rich mix of humorous encounters with kids and adults, interspersed with some very touching and sometimes sad moments. At times the author seems to channel his inner Jean Shepherd, but telling the stories from Santa's point of view rather than Ralphie's. The reader is given a glimpse of the trials and tribulations of a mall Santa, but throughout you feel the tremendous sense of fulfillment he receives from his experiences with the children. It clearly takes a great deal of courage to deal with the different personalities, expectations and life situations of his various visitors and to communicate to them the wonderful message of Christmas. The children that visited this Santa were very lucky indeed! Here is one Santa who obviously understands and loves children and never loses sight of the true meaning

of Christmas. I can only hope that he will continue his career as Santa and produce another volume of his experiences in the future.

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
